A message from the Rector

he Bible says that when John the Baptist was in prison, he sent his disciples to ask Jesus, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we expect someone else?" What a question. John proclaimed Jesus as the Messiah, the One whose sandals he was not worthy to untie, the One to save the world. The Gospel according to Luke says they were cousins. So, doesn't John know who Jesus is?

But things are obviously not going well for John. He's in prison on borrowed time. Soon Herod would kill him. And Jesus? He's not acting like John expected. John expected fire and winnowing forks. John expected justice. John expected the Messiah to set things right. But he hears that Jesus eats with tax collectors, and for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do is soft on prostitutes, and apparently, He hasn't called down holy fire on anyone. What kind of self-respecting Messiah is this?!

But Jesus replied to John's followers, "Go back and report to John what you hear and see: The blind receive sight, the lame walk, those who have leprosy are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the good news is proclaimed to the poor." In other words, the presence of Jesus is transforming the world to further God's purposes. But to see the things going right, they need to quit concentrating so much on the things that are still going wrong. Even with Jesus in it, the world is not perfect. There is evil, there are challenges, people don't think and act the way we think they should. So sometimes it's hard to see the good.

Yet Jesus says the Kingdom is like leaven hidden in flour, or a seed hidden in the ground, or a net lowered into the depths of the sea, or stuff packed in a storeroom. It's not always obvious, and things could be happening that we can't see yet. I know in my own life it's often only when I look back I see that God was at work. But at the time, I didn't realize it.

So what does that mean for us? It means when we start feeling overwhelmed or frustrat- for John, and for us.

ed, when things clearly aren't going right, when life is hard, or dark, or scary, and the future seems bleak, we can and should hang on to hope. We are people of faith, and faith strengthens hope. The letter to the Hebrews says "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." So even if we don't yet see God at work, we have the conviction, through faith, that those things for which we hope are assured. Evil never has the last word with God.

It also means we need to be patient and remain faithful. In his letter to the Romans, Paul says, "For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes not see, we wait for it with patience." That's hard for me; I'm not a patient person. I want this pandemic to be over and let us get back to church. I want my eye to heal so I can get back to normal activities. I want the divisions between Americans to heal now. And it is always tempting to try to hurry things along. But that is not faithful.

If we truly believe, through faith, that God is already at work and transforming the world in God's own time, then even if we don't see it yet, we need to continue to live faithfully and wisely. So, we will continue to practice social distancing and mask wearing. I will follow doctor's orders about rest and medication. And we will keep on praying that God will soften our hearts toward each other, and help us to see and appreciate the things that connect us rather than the things that divide us.

But what about John, stuck in that prison with execution in his near future? What hope can he have? He has the hope of new and better life even after death. Paul said "the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed." That's always true,
